Thanksgiving Expressed

Luke 17:11-19

We have so much to be thankful for and yet sometimes it seems we forget. All that we have is because God has bestowed His gracious blessings toward us. Thanksgiving is mentioned in the Bible over forty times. Today let us look at lessons of Thanksgiving from a leper.

1) They all called on Jesus.

Notice that the lepers here stood afar off from Jesus. Why? To know we need to turn to Leviticus 13:44-46. These men had an incurable disease. The doctors could not cure them. It was a very infectious disease and could easily be spread. Their skin literally was rotting on their body. Literally their fingers would fall off, noses would rot off, and eyes would fall out of the socket. It was a nasty incurable disease and no one wanted it.

When a person was found to have leprosy, they were considered cursed and the law said they must live outside the city, either alone or with other lepers. As we see here, there were ten of them traveling together. And in desperation, these lepers cry out to Jesus "Master, have pity on us."

Our Lord is rich in mercy. Lamentations 3:22-23 tells us that His mercies are new every morning. We don't have to rely on yesterday. They are new every morning.

We see these lepers cry out to Jesus because of their hopeless state. They have called upon the right Man.

These lepers had many things in common with us. They were all afflicted with the same disease. Let's draw a parallel here to say that leprosy is a picture of the sinful state of us all. We all have the incurable disease of sin in our lives. It is disfiguring, it rots the flesh, and causes us to be like lepers, those who are unclean (Romans 3:23). They were all dying men from this disease. You and I were the same way (Romans

6:23). Without the intervention of Christ on their behalf, they had no hope. We were the same.

Look at Ephesians 2:11-13. Can you identify with these lepers? When they cried out unto Jesus, He heard them and...

2) They were all cleansed .

Notice in verse 14 when He saw them, our Lord looked upon them and had compassion. We know that because it says He responded to their call. He heard their cry. It reminds us of Jeremiah 33:3 and Romans 10:13.

But notice Jesus told them in verse 14 to "Go show yourselves to the priest." Why? Because His command demanded that they put their faith in Him. Faith is an action word. They must show by action they believe Him.

Notice it says "as they went they were cleansed." It didn't happen until they went. Their first step of faith brought cleansing. Faith in Christ brings immediate cleansing. And why go to the priests? What hope do you think they had in the priests? Do you think they might have already cried out to the priests for help? The priests were hopeless as well. The religion of the day could do nothing for their state of hopelessness. Jesus wanted the lepers to see that but He also wanted the priest to see it as well.

The same is true today. Religion cannot help you in your hopeless state. In the incurable disease of sin the priest cannot heal you and he cannot cure you. But if you will take the first step of faith, you will experience immediate cleansing through Jesus Christ. After they saw that they were cleansed, there was only...

3) The one who was Thankful .

Upon seeing that he was healed, he came back to Jesus. Out of his thankfulness he glorified God with a loud voice. That's what happens when you are truly thankful. You can't help but get loud.

Not only did the leper glorify God with a loud voice but he fell down at the feet of Jesus and gave thanks. Sometimes the only true place of thanksgiving is at the feet of Jesus. Why was this leper thankful?

- He had been hopeless, now he had hope.
- He had been homeless, now he could go home.
- He had been rejected, now he would be received.
- He had been basically pronounced dead, now he was alive again.

We too should be able to see ourselves in this leper. We ought to be thankful for the cleansing power of Jesus in our lives just like the leper. There was one leper who was thankful but there was...

4) The nine who were Thankless .

Nine others had been cleansed but they went on their way. Even Jesus asked in verse 17 "where are the other nine?" This should be a wake call to us as the church. How many of us are like the nine lepers? Why didn't they come back?

Here are a few suggestions that I came up with and they reveal a whole lot about human nature.

- One waited to see if the cure was real.
- One waited to see if it would last.
- One said he would see Jesus later.
- One decided that he had never had leprosy.
- One said he would have gotten well anyway.
- One gave the glory to the priests.
- One said, "O, well, Jesus didn't really do anything."
- One said, "Any rabbi could have done it."

- One said, "I was already much improved."

Maybe they all ran home, to friends, families, etc., to share with them what had happened. We cannot speak for them, but we can look at the story and see what delighted Jesus. In verse 19 He said to him, "Rise and go; your faith has made you well." Jesus insinuated that the man's action had not resulted in healing, but had made him whole spiritually. He gave praise to Jesus for changing his life.

We all get so busy. We all make many excuses. We all try to rationalize. But the truly thankful people take time to come back to the one who cured them and gives thanks.

Conclusion

The fact that only one returned to offer thanksgiving has been considered by some as a picture of the church today. Some say that only one-tenth of the church is truly thankful. How can they make such a claim? Now, I'm not saying it is this way here, but some places statistically only 1/10th tithe out of their thankfulness and gratitude. Only 1/10th is involved in doing for the Lord. There are some gatherings where only 1/10th show up.

So the question for us is: Which are you today? Are you like the one thankful leper? Or are you part of the nine?

If you say, "I am like the one," then on what do you base that statement? Does the Lord see that by your actions? Are you faithful to your church in attendance? Do you not only tithe but give an offering to God? Are you involved in the planning and action of the ministry of your church?

The good news is that Jesus commends a thankful person. You can start today. Come to His altar today and express your thankfulness and give thanks to the Lord. He deserves our thanksgiving and praise.

Counterfeit Thanksgiving

A young, single attorney worked for a generous boss who gave all his employees a turkey each year at Thanksgiving. One year before the birds were handed out, some of his co-workers replaced his real turkey with one made of papier-mâché. On the Wednesday before Thanksgiving, the attorney went to the company boardroom, picked up his assigned turkey, and thanked his boss for his job and the bird.

Later, on the bus home, the young man wondered what to do with his prize. As a bachelor, he couldn't possibly eat it all by himself. Before long, a rather worn-down, discouraged-looking man got on the bus and sat next to the attorney. As they talked, the young man learned that the stranger had spent the entire day job-hunting with no luck. The man had a large family, and was wondering what he would do about Thanksgiving the next day.

Suddenly the attorney was struck with an idea: Why not give his turkey to this man! But how? The fellow wasn't a freeloader and probably wouldn't accept charity. So the attorney asked, "How much money do you have?" When the man said just a couple of dollars, the attorney yelled "Sold!" and put the turkey in the stranger's lap. Moved to tears, the stranger later got off the bus and waved good-bye, thrilled that his family would have a turkey for Thanksgiving.

The next Monday, the attorney's friends were dying to know about the turkey. You can imagine their dismay and the young attorney's horror when they both learned what each had done. For a week, the attorney and his co-workers rode the bus searching for the stranger they had unintentionally wronged, but they never found him.

How rotten must that attorney have felt? What about the stranger? Can you imagine what he thought when he discovered the turkey was only a glob of paper?
