The Perfect Christian

Matthew 5:38-48

In the last sentence of our passage today, Jesus says something that is very confusing. What does it mean to be a perfect Christian? Perhaps these three usages of the word perfect from Scripture will be helpful.

1) The Perfection OF Christ.

a) Totally sinless .

We tend to think of perfection in one way only: total sinlessness. As perfection is applied to Jesus and God, that is true. The Scriptures tell us that God is perfect and cannot be tempted to sin. Jesus, God in the flesh, could be tempted but was without sin. Jesus never sinned. Not once, nor ever. That is perfect moral perfection.

b) Only true of Christ.

Perfect moral perfection belongs to, or is true of Jesus and no one else. Romans 3:23 describes the situation for everyone else: "For all have sinned." God does not expect you or me to have the absolute moral and sinless perfection which Jesus had because He told us it was impossible. So there is the Perfection *OF* Christ, a level of perfection to which you and I will not be held.

2) The Perfection IN Christ.

In order to illustrate this we can use this donut to help us understand the Biblical concept of the Perfection *IN* Christ. Is this Donut real? (I produced a picture of a donut.) Yes, it is real, even though it is merely a picture of a donut. Is the hole in the middle of the donut real? Yes, it is. It is real even though we cannot touch it or see it

or taste it or experience it with any of our senses. If it were a make-believe hole, nothing would go through it, like my finger. But a real hole is kind of a contradiction. It is real but yet it isn't. I can't take the hole out of the donut and place it in front of you for you to examine it.

a) Only in connection .

Now listen really closely to what I am about to say: The hole exists **only in relationship to the donut**. The hole exists **only in connection to the donut**. The hole exists *only* if the donut exists. If you take away the donut, the hole no longer exists.

Now, stay with me, don't lose me now. This donut represents the Sinless Moral and Spiritual perfection of Jesus Christ. He is absolutely perfect, that is, sinlessly, purely, perfect. He is everything that you and I cannot be. The hole represents my perfection, and yours, in relationship to His. My perfection is not a perfection of actions or goodness. It is not moral perfection or sinlessness. It is my perfection and it is only in relationship to Him. When I got saved, His perfection was granted to me. Now it is my standing before God. Apart from the perfection of Jesus Christ I have no perfection. I am a sinner, a self-centered, flesh pleasing, greedy, lustful, lying, sinner. My perfection, like the donut hole is real, but only in relation to His perfection. Colossians 2:10 reminds us we are complete, or perfect through our union with Christ, Who is the head.

b) Only in standing .

So, understand, our perfection is not in sinlessness, but in standing. It is given, apportioned, awarded, bequeathed, conferred, granted, hand out, imparted, etc., not on the basis of my perfection, but on the basis of His perfection.

3) The Perfection LIKE Christ.

But there is another Biblical dimension to perfection, another meaning of perfect. This dimension or definition is not about our standing or our imputed perfection. It is the perfection *LIKE* Christ. This meaning is more about what we are to be or become. It is about our actions and our conduct

a) The level of maturity .

In Greek, the word translated "perfect" in Matthew 5 is "teleios (tel-lai-os)." "Teleios" appears 48 times in the New Testament, and is often translated, especially in the early English versions of the Scriptures, as "perfect." The root word "**tel-os**" means "one who has accomplished the intended goal." If something accomplishes what it is designed to do, it is said to be perfect, that is, "teleios." So "teleios" is often translated as "mature" or "complete." And for a Christian mature equals mature or complete in the faith.

So then what does it mean to be "mature" in the faith? It means to live in such a way that you and others can see that the seed has been planted and grown to the point that you now bear fruit, or act like Jesus Christ.

In our text today, Jesus gives us some examples of the maturity perfection like Christ produces. He talks about loving your enemies, and praying for those who hate you. Why should we do that? That is the nature of God our Father. And when we do those things we show that we have matured to be like Him.

If you only love those who are nice to you it does not show that you are mature. Anyone will do that. It takes maturity to rise above petty disagreements and resentments. And God our Father has modeled this type of love for us. The Father loved us when we were His enemies. 1 John 4:16 expands on this. And that is just one of the ways that we can be mature like our Father in Heaven. Luke 6:35 tells us to be merciful, just as our Father is merciful. Maturity means being merciful so that

we are like Christ. We are told in John 1:5-9 that "God is light." Jesus taught in Matthew 5:16 to let our light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in heaven. We are called to be mature to become like our Heavenly Father.

b) The level of judgement .

We are not going to be held to the Perfection *OF* Christ. We cannot claim any credit for the Perfection *IN* Christ. It is a perfection we did not earn. It is given or granted. But the Perfection *LIKE* CHRIST... the maturity of living *LIKE* CHRIST is the perfection to which we are to strive. The perfection *LIKE* Christ is the level of perfection by which we will be judged.

Conclusion

Are you growing in your maturity? Are you becoming more and more *LIKE* Christ? Let me sum it up for you. We *WORSHIP* the perfection *OF* Christ. We praise Him for His perfection. We *CELEBRATE* our perfection *IN* Christ. We thank God that He has clothed us in the perfection and righteousness of His Son. We glory in the standing that we have before God because we are *IN* Christ. We *CONFESS* our failure to live up to the level of *MATURITY* to which we have been called, and we *BESEECH* God to help us to be *MATURE LIKE* Christ.

Know Who You Are

In his book "Growing in Grace," Bob George tells the following illustration.

When you first met "J.E.", you could tell he was a very angry man. In fact, at age 54 he'd been an angry person for many years. In a Bible study that night, many questions had been raised in his mind. Talking with the leader afterward, J.E. said, "I asked Jesus to be my Savior when I was 9 years old. But nobody ever taught me about who I am in Christ, that I'm accepted by God or that Christ lives in me."

"What were you taught?" the Bible study leader asked. "Where I grew up, we heard all the time about how perfect Christ was and about how we should learn to live like Him – if we didn't, God would judge us." J.E. went on, "It didn't take me long, I'd say in my teen years, to figure out that I was never going to cut it. So I gave up trying. I guess I've been living in guilt and running from

God ever since. Off and on through the years I tried to go back to church, but I just got more guilt piled on top of me. I've sat under so many teachers who made me fearful that I was afraid to turn in any direction because God was going to get me. This is the first Bible study I've ever attended that gave me any hope," J.E. concluded.

At that point, J.E. was 54 years old. That means, even though he had been born again through trusting Jesus Christ at a young age, he had spent the majority of his years running away from God. Tragically, his experience isn't that unusual. Thousands of people who sincerely responded to the Gospel message spend years thrashing around trying to make it work, but without success. In fact, I believe the reason so many Christians struggle in living the Christian life is their lack of understanding their Identity in Christ.

If this is true, surely it affects the church. In his book, "The Family of God," Batsell Barrett Baxter says the following:

There are some who think of the church as an organization like other organizations. It is true that the church is an organization, but it is not primarily an organization. Rather it is a new way of life. Those who have the view that being a part of the church is like being a member of a lodge, a luncheon club, a political party, or even a business are seriously mistaken. Such people feel that they should give to the church the same kind of support and loyalty which they give to these other organizations. It becomes my church, as it is 'my club, or lodge, or party, or team.' The Christian's loyalty to Church, however, should be unique, for in reality it is a loyalty to Christ and His way of life. The church is like no other institution on earth and a person's membership in the church is like no other membership which he may sustain. The church is more like a vibrant, living organism, than it is like a cold, structured organization...

Some make the mistake of thinking that the church exists for the entertainment and enjoyment of its members. On the contrary, the church exists in order that its members may have an intimate relationship with God through Christ Jesus, as well as a closer relationship with mankind.
