God Speaks on Thanksgiving

1 Timothy 2:1-8

Thanksgiving is more than a day off. It is more than eating mashed potatoes and gravy, watching football, and taking a wonderful turkey-induced nap. Thanksgiving is a pervasive and essential concept in Scripture. And although it is good to set aside a Thursday each November to cultivate a heart of thanksgiving, the Scriptures have more to say about giving thanks than one day a year can handle. Here are five biblical truths about thanksgiving.

1. Thanksgiving is Trinitarian .

The typical pattern of thanksgiving in the New Testament is that God the Father is the object of thanksgiving, God the Son is the person through whom thanksgiving flows, and God the Holy Spirit is the source of thanksgiving.

A. Father - Romans 1:8

B. Son - Colossians 3:16-17

C. Holy Spirit - Romans 8:5-8

The very presence of thanksgiving points to the Holy Spirit as the source of thanksgiving because without the work of the Spirit it is impossible to please God (Romans 8:5-8).

Christianity does not call for vague thanksgiving to a vague deity. Our God is triune and, as a result, thanksgiving has a Trinitarian flavor. Thanksgiving flows to God the Father, through God the Son, from God the Spirit.

2. Thanksgiving Replaces Sin .

When Paul commands believers to stop sinning, he also commands believers to put thanksgiving in its place (Ephesians 5:4). Paul knows that we are always acting. We

either act with sinful, thankless hearts which leads to foolish talk or crude jokes, or we act with thankful hearts and thereby please God with our speech. John Piper explains, "The key to unlocking a heart of gratitude and overcoming bitterness and ugliness and disrespect and violence is a strong belief in God, the Creator and Sustainer and Provider and Hope-giver. If we do not believe we are deeply indebted to God for all we have or hope to have, then the very spring of gratitude has gone dry." ("Violence, Ugliness, and Thanksgiving")

3. Thanksgiving Sanctifies Creation .

How should Christians think about God's good creation? Paul says that it should be received with a heart full of thanksgiving (1 Timothy 4:4).

Paul teaches that creation is good and should be received with thanksgiving because it is made holy through the word of God and prayer. John Piper explains the connection between the goodness of creation, thanksgiving, and prayer:

"The word of God teaches us to taste food as a communication of His diverse goodness and his supreme worth. And when we taste food as a communication of God's goodness and worth in the eating of this food, we offer up our prayers of thanks, and ask him to give us the fullest possible feast of his supreme worth. And we pray this in Jesus's name, knowing that every lasting blessing was bought by his blood" (from "What God Made Is Good and Must Be Sanctified").

4. Thanksgiving for the Gospel .

We should aim to have our thanksgiving rise in proportion to the value of the object for which we give thanks. Therefore, we should be most grateful for God's work for us in Christ because it unites us to our highest joy – God himself (1 Corinthians 1:4).

Paul never tired of giving thanks for the grace of God in Jesus's person and work. And neither should we. God has showed his love for us even when we were enemies of God (Romans 5:8); he called us out of darkness and made us heirs of God (Romans 8:17); Jesus bore the punishment we deserved, and we receive his perfect righteousness (2 Corinthians 5:21).

5. Thanksgiving in All Circumstances .

One surprising aspect of thanksgiving is that it's for all circumstances, not just one big meal a year (1 Thessalonians 5:16–18).

Giving thanks in all circumstances is especially difficult while undergoing suffering. How can we be thankful when there's something that hurts so much? We can give thanks in the midst of suffering because it is meant to enlarge our faith, not as punishment (2 Corinthians 4:17–18), and because it is redemptive, not random.

Our suffering is not punishment for our sin — because Christ has borne our punishment in our place (Romans 3:25). The demands of justice have been met. And our suffering is not random — because God is sovereign over it, and through it God is conforming us in the image of his Son (Romans 8:28–29).

Conclusion

The official designated Thanksgiving Day is wonderful, but everyday should be a day of thanking God.

Let's thank God:

For all the gifts that Thou dost send,

For every kind and loyal friend,

For prompt supply of all my need,

For all that's good in word or deed,

For gift of health along life's way.

For strength to work from day to day.

I give Thee humble thanks.

*For ready hands to help and cheer,
For listening ears Thy voice to hear,
For yielded tongue Thy love to talk,
For willing feet Thy paths to walk,
For open eyes Thy word to read,
For loving heart Thy will to heed,
I give Thee humble thanks.*

*For Christ who came from Heaven above,
For the Cross and His redeeming love,
For His mighty power to seek and save,
For His glorious triumph o'er the grave,

Showing Thankfulness

Returning thanks is a learned trait. We are not born grateful creatures. Pick up a baby for just a little while and you're holding in your arms what could be best described as a schizophrenic. One minute cooing, the next crying; one minute silent, the next screaming; one minute friendly looking into your eyes, the next flailing every limb with bowed back and blood-red face; one minute smelling sweet, the next...well, you know. Babies are not born saying, "Thanks." It is not even the first word they learn. In order for children to learn to return thanks, they must be taught.

Max Lucado tells about living as an American in Brazil. One day, as he was walking along the street on his way to the University to teach a class, he felt a tug on his pants leg. Turning around, he saw a little boy about 5 or 6 years old with dark beady eyes and a dirty little face. The little boy looked up at the big American and said, "Bread, Sir." He was a little beggar boy and Lucado said, "There are always little beggar boys in the streets of Brazil. Usually I turn away from them because there are so many and you can't feed them all. But there was something so compelling about this little boy that I couldn't turn away."

"So, taking his hand, I said, 'Come with me' and I took him into a coffee shop." Max told the owner, "I'll have a cup of coffee and give the boy a piece of pastry...whatever he wants." Since the coffee counter was at the other end of the store, Max walked on and got a cup of coffee, forgetting about the little boy because beggar boys usually get the bread and then run back out into the street and disappear. But this one didn't. After he got his pastry, he went over to the big American and just stood there until Lucado felt his staring eyes. Lucado said, "I

turned and looked at him. Standing up, his eyes just about hit my belt buckle. Then slowly his eyes came up until they met mine. The little boy, holding his pastry in one hand, looked up and said, 'Thank you, sir. Thank you very much.'"

Lucado said, "I was so touched by the boy's thanks that I would have bought him the store. I sat there for another 30 minutes, late for my class, just thinking about a little beggar boy who came back and said, 'Thank you.'" This young lad had an attitude of thankfulness and it was expressed. If we have this attitude, it will show. We will be expressive and praising God; we will have joy in our hearts. Having an attitude of thankfulness is ultra-important in the life of a follower of Jesus.

In Luke 17:11-17 there is a familiar story about ten lepers who encountered Jesus and asked Him to heal them. Jesus told them to go and show themselves to the priest in order to get validation on their healing. Somewhere along the way, they were all healed but only one of the ten lepers came back to express his gratitude to God.

Someone gave several suggestions why the other nine never returned to give thanks. One waited to see if the cure was real. One waited to see if it would last. One said he would catch up to Jesus later. One decided that he had never had leprosy. One said he would have gotten well anyway. One gave the glory to the Priests. One said, "O well, Jesus didn't really do anything. It just happened." One said, Any rabbi could have done it. One said I was already much improved."

And then there was one who returned to give God praise. Gratitude is the heart of giving thanks for the favor one receives. Since Christians have been given so much, every day ought to be a day of thanksgiving.
