The Gift of a Savior

Hebrews 2:10-18

Another Christmas celebration has come and gone. In the midst of all the sparkling lights and noise of the season, it's easy to forget the powerful purpose of the Incarnation. To a lost world God gave us the gift of His Son to be Our Savior.

1. He became one of us.

Have you ever stopped to think that Jesus was unqualified to be our Savior before He became a man? In verse 10 the word "appropriate" emphasized in Greek this was God's perfect plan. The One who would deliver us, save us from our darkened sinfulness, had to be perfected for the task. It means to perfect, to qualify.

Every year thousands of would-be professional golfers attend "qualifying school." Those who suffer successfully become pros.

This suffering Christ experienced was not just the cross. He joined the human race, experienced the pain of living in a sinful world.

In his book "Black Like Me" John Howard Griffin tells the fictitious story of a white man in the South who darkened his skin and then walked throughout the South to experience what it was like to be an African American. The love of Jesus compelled Him to share the plight of those He calls brothers. Clearly in the economy and plan of God, it was required that our Lord and Savior suffer as a man in the kingdom of Satan, to go right into his living room and defeat him in the area of his greatest strength. That arena of great strength is the power of death.

2. He faced death for us.

There is a potent statement in verses 14-15 that we need to understand. Jesus became a man so he could defeat Satan on his own turf. And in doing so, verse 15 says His death also frees "those who all their lives have been held in slavery."

This is at the heart of the Christmas message: we don't want to miss it. We humans think we are OK as long as we remain alive. But death for us is a great unknown, an area of great speculation, if we choose to ignore God's revelation. We are trapped in the physical world, cut off from the spiritual.

This fear gives Satan a huge opportunity to deceive. He began the problem by telling Adam and Eve that they would not die if they ate the forbidden fruit (Genesis 3:4).

And now he continues to convince people under the curse that what they fear most will never happen. The fear of death is the fear of judgment, pure and simple. It's the same reason that in the passage last week we saw that the evil people avoid the light, because it will expose their sinfulness (John 3:20).

The nonbeliever hates the thought of his sin being exposed. But they have a sneaking suspicion that after they die, there could be a judgment. So Satan leaps on this fear and proposes a whole host of soothing remedies.

Take the Islamic faith. Works righteousness is the center of what they believe. Or examine what Buddhists belief. Buddha said to prepare for a peaceful death, One should: "Not be fond of a busy life involved in various activities, not be fond of being talkative, not be fond of sleeping, not be fond of having too many companions, not be fond of too much social intercourse, not be fond of daydreaming." Man, if this is correct, I'm toast!

And if these can't help you, there is always alcohol and drugs and materialism and entertainment to produce a fog that keeps you from thinking about it. God's solution was simple and incredibly effective. The sting of death is sin (1 Corinthians 15:56).

If sin could be dealt with, then the death penalty disappears, as does the fear of judgment. Satan deals with the symptoms, "you'll be fine." He sells us some "Snake oil." But God goes straight for the disease. In His death, Jesus gave atonement.

Greek word =to propitiate=to pay the penalty for a misdeed so powerfully that the offended deity is no longer angry, but instead is your friend. Death is fearful because of sin. Jesus paid the death debt we owed, and now we have nothing to fear.

And the amazing thing is that He used the very thing we were afraid of, death, the very penalty for our sin, and used it to defeat Satan and free us.

It's like causing a person to lose weight by eating an entire chocolate cake for him.

3. He intercedes for us.

This passage teaches that Jesus is the perfect High Priest. In the Jewish system, the High priest atoned for his own sin, then the sins of others. This recognition of personal sin by the priest identified with other sinners. This is a critical part of Jesus' qualification for being our Savior. He knew the power of being tempted. He knew the power of death, and even the fear of it in his humanity. Matthew 26:39 tells us... He prayed not My will but Thy will be done.

He is now able to "help" us, because He is one of us and has experienced in His body the wrath of God, which we are all under. He knew the separation from God, knew the agony of being cut off from the spiritual realm while dying in the physical.

Our amazing multi-tasking God not only entered our limited world, but in doing so atoned for our sins with such intense identification that at the same time He was atoning He was experiencing the pain of separation in the spiritual that we all know but that He had never known.

In doing so, He knew the terror of being cut off from God and became our Interceding Savior; One who can empathize with our condition from very real experience. His intercession for us took on a depth of compassion and love that is beyond our imagination.

Conclusion

It all started in a humble stall, with the plaintive cry of the Son of God beginning His suffering the way every baby does, the trauma of birth. This is why we try to sweep away the clutter and noise of the secular holiday that Christmas has become. It shrouds the glorious miracle of God becoming a man so that He might rescue us from the darkness of our physical dungeon, trapped by fear and ignorance, hoping against hope that something we can do inside these walls can guarantee that we will not be destroyed by judgment.

But He did become a man, and in doing so rescued us with a love that cannot be described with our limited vocabulary. The sin barrier has been removed, the bridge has been built to span the canyon between you and God, and the judgment you dread has been absorbed by the Righteous One, God who became a man to defeat sin and death.

Will you receive that gift today, by taking your first step on that bridge that is Jesus Christ?

Some folks make resolutions for the New Year. Perhaps you've already made a few. It's disappointing when we make them and then break them. We may start out well but our zeal cools down the first time we fudge a little or cheat on our commitment. If there is truly one resolution we all need to make this year it is to be closer to God. We can all agree that we would like to draw nearer to Him, but our zeal can easily disappear after a little while.

As a church, are we looking to have a purposeful, powerful year for the Lord Jesus Christ in

2019? As your pastor I am expecting great things from this New Year. Wouldn't it be great if we could break out of our slump and reach new people for God's Kingdom? What would you see as a reachable baptism goal for this year? How can we see our goals become reality? Are you praying for FIVE new families? We can have a purposeful, powerful year for the Lord if we will dedicate ourselves to cry out to God through prayer for our church and city. Our crying out to God must not end after we get past the newness of it, but we must continue until a movement of prayer is ignited within us.
